One man's opinion

Recently we have read a special informative editorial in the April edition of QST written by Tom Gallagher, NY2RF. The article attempted to dispel the rumors abounding about the future of the Official Observer Program. According to Mister Gallagher the league is in the process of reworking the entire program regarding Official Observers.

For those of you vaguely familiar with the Official Observer program I will tell you what we are not and what we are doing for ham radio.

We are not an enforcement arm of the F.C.C.

We do not levy fines, confiscate equipment of the offender, invade any residence, or attempt to arrest any one.

We as a group are advisers and that is it, we advise those who are in violation, or have some minor infraction of the rules and regulations. As an instance, you might receive an OO notice if your audio has hum, or audio is distorted.

You may receive a notice for out of band operation, example of this is operating on frequencies not allowed for your license class.

On CW, key clicks, or a chirpy signal, in some cases of the vintage rigs harmonics may be generated.

Failure to ID properly and this does happen on

repeaters a lot, you may receive a friendly notice.

Receiving a notice does not require a reply, the person receiving the notice may take the advice, or simply throw the notice in the trash can. Of course we hope the advice is heeded, but if it is not then additional monitoring may be required.

With that said, we have nearly a thousand ham radio ops who are serving as Official Observers, I my self have served as the Official Observer Coordinator for the last fifteen years for the state of Kentucky.

However, those years have not been without some frustration, disappointments, or we have felt we did not get the reaction of enforcement from the Commission we expected.

This of course has led to many dropping out of the program and the frustration level has hit an all time high. So, now the league is telling us the program is heading for a total fix and reorganization, or at least that is what we are led to believe. To be quite honest about it, we have not received a single thing regarding changes, all we have been told is no further applications for an OO will be accepted until the new program comes in place.

I have had two instances of flagrant violations in my own state, well let's make it three, egregious behavior, plus an unlicensed operation, and the prize of all superfluous distress transmissions and false attacks against the United States. All these were submitted three months ago, our connection at the league that does the forwarding to the FCC has not replied to his mail in over two months. So, who is in charge of the program, has our appointments been suspended, does the program still exist? No one has made an effort to fully explain the new status, well granted an insert on the back pages of QST and that has been it.

The fear I have will be we will have a new suit of clothes and underneath the old ways will still exist. Maybe, we will have more shuck and Jive, double talk, confused meanings, and the league distancing themselves from an OO sending a report to an

offender. Keep in mind, if we had any direction before, the pass off was you send the notice, you deal with the problem, you take the responsibility. The appointees in the OO program dangle in the wind and receive only the above mentioned double talk, shuck and Jive and confused meanings.

Personally, with no information from the league, little enforcement from the FCC and a one woman operation to deal with the problems of ham radio, well the future to me is dim. Eleven offices of the FCC have closed further reducing the effect benefit of enforcement. Yet, we are led to believe they have our backs covered. I do not buy it for now, there will have to be a major overhaul with the OO program and of course more enforcement.

The ball is in their court, but scoring points is just not an urgent priority, shame it is, our times have changed. Let's see what happens, I do not expect much.

A few years ago the FCC switched from being an enforcement agency to a frequency selling agency.

Enforcement was only something when big dollars were involved or politics was part of the deal. Let's examine what happened to one valuable resource under the watchful eye of the FCC.

Citizens Band radio was a portion of the 10-11 meter band. In about 1945 frequencies were set aside for personal and business communications for the average citizen or small business. A class D license was required but was easy to obtain. A fee of \$5.00 and filling out a simple license request was all that was needed.

Now people could stay in contact on camping, Small walkie-talkie units were becoming available to reach the family on hiking trips. Farmers could reach units in the field and homes could keep in contact with their family members via mobile radios. Small businesses that could not afford the very expensive UHF units of early citizens band frequencies could now have communications with trucks and mobile units.

A set of rules were established (Part 97) and most people respected it and followed the rules. Violators were dealt with by the FCC and stiff fines were imposed for serious infractions. In some cases the FCC had the power to take your radio equipment. Field units actually listened to the airways for violations.

The movie Smoky and the Bandit launched CB into the popular spotlight and everyone had to have one. About that time the FCC decided \$5.00 was not enough to police the bands with their limited resources and ask for license fee increases. Requests were denied so the FCC simply dropped the license fee and at the same time stopped most enforcement of the 11 meter band. Citizens band developed into a cesspool of bad manners, profanity, rule violations and even a dangerous place to operate.

The FCC to date does <u>very little</u> enforcement activity, even with hundreds of complaints from citizens and public utilities. Since the FCC is part of the Executive Branch, local law enforcement's hands are tied unless local governments enact special ordinances to deal with the problem. Basically it has turned into a CB free for all. It even turned into a means for prostitutes and drug dealers to advertise their wares. Bullying others was common as small men hid behind microphones and acted like bad men.

Amateur radio had long been enforced by "gentlemen's agreement" and has been self-policed by amateurs themselves. The Official Observers were started as a means to politely inform hams of rule violations, improper operation, equipment

problems and even notice of outstanding performance by operators. Usually a notice was all that was needed to correct the problems.

Enter an era of newer operators that have little regard for rules or self-governing. You can hear them on the various bands acting like CB (Children's Band) operators and disregarding the rules. Profanity, illegal operation, wide band splatter, higher than legal power etc. Notices from Official Observers are ignored and sometimes answered with threats and violence. Notices sent to the FCC by the local Official Observers go unnoticed or completely ignored. It sometimes takes years to rein in a violator

New hams, hearing all this, often drop out of the hobby or lose interest altogether with ham radio. Will Ham Radio go the way of the CB radio? With little or no cooperation from the FCC, it is a possibility. Riley Hollingsworth demonstrated how the job was supposed to be done. So far, the new director shows little of any desire to continue the job. The ARRL seems not to follow up with OO complaints with any enthusiasm and wants to make entry level license more easier with each new test.

May thanks to Bill and our Official Obvers for what you do. Many thanks to the hams that follow the rules and promote the hobby.





A bit of Trivia

Antenna

We use them every day.

Where did the name come from?

The origin of the word *antenna* relative to wireless apparatus is attributed to Italian radio pioneer Guglielmo Marconi. In the summer of 1895, Marconi began testing his wireless system outdoors on his father's estate near Bologna and soon began to experiment with long wire "aerials". Marconi discovered that by raising the "aerial" wire above the ground and connecting the other side of his transmitter to ground, the transmission range was increased. [5] Soon he was able to transmit signals over a hill, a distance of approximately 2.4 kilometers (1.5 mi). [6] In Italian a tent pole is known as *l'antenna* centrale, and the pole with the wire was simply called *l'antenna*. Until then wireless radiating transmitting and receiving elements were known simply as aerials or terminals. Because of his prominence, Marconi's use of the word *antenna* spread among wireless researchers, and later to the general public



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CERT – Community Emergency Response Team – An Element of Indiana Department of Homeland Security

Welcome to the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT) information page. Here you can find an explanation of the Program itself; as well as registration requirements and class schedules.

CERT IS NEIGHBORHOOD-ORIENTED

Following a disaster in your neighborhood, you will be able to use the CERT training provided; ensuring you and your family are safe and secure and then using your training to help your neighborhood. No one in CERT self-deploys to another area without a specific call out from the Director of Emergency Management. When professional first responders arrive on site; you will know to give them all documentation and possible search and rescue information you may have accrued as

you worked your neighborhood. At that point, you may step out of the situation or ask if you can assist the professionals in any way.

Sponsorship: The CERT Program is overseen by Citizen Corps of Evansville and EMA Advisory Board and is sponsored locally by the Evansville/Vanderburgh County Emergency Management Agency (EMA); Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and the Indiana Department of Homeland Security (IDHS). All classes and equipment are provided for you free of charge and there are no dues.

Training: Local CERT Programs offer training to the public and organizations and all CERT Instructors are FEMA certified. CERT Instructors will emphasize disaster preparedness and planning for hazards that may impact your family and your neighborhood and will focus their training on basic disaster response skills such as fire safety, light search and rescue, team organization, and disaster medical operations. To continue as an active CERT, a requirement of at least 6 hours of "Continual Education Classes" or drill/exercises is considered the minimum for active status per year.

"Open classes" are scheduled for 2017 during the months of May and October and are open to the public with completed application form and background check approval. (Actual Dates of classes are posted below.)

FEMA-based Classroom Training:

- Disaster Preparedness
- Introduction to the Incident Command System
- Basic Fire Suppression
- Basic first aid and triage (2 Units)
- Search and Rescue and cribbing
- CERT and Psychology
- CERT and Terrorism

Program Registration and Open CERT Class Training Dates for 2017:

Each candidate must complete an Application
 Form and pass a background check. The
 Application form is included in your packet of
 information we have passed out to you tonight.
 If you are interested in taking the May
 session, please fill out the form and hand it
 in to a CERT representative at the sign in
 table and place your name on the May Class

Schedule Sheet. If you are considering the October Classes, please indicate that you prefer October, again at the sign in table.

CERT representatives will be available to help you with the entire process.

• CLASS SCHEDULES:

The application form must be completed first. We do have a maximum amount of candidates we can take for each class. Your application may be turned in to us tonight if you are considering May. We will follow up with those preferring October classes and you may fill out your application after we contact you.

Classroom training is held at the CERT Training
Center located at 1440 Harmony Way in Evansville.
FEMA requires a total of 21 hours of instruction to
become a CERT. Each set of classes is arranged in 3
hour increments from 6:00pm to 9:00pm each
Tuesday and Thursday night for 3 weeks with a
Saturday morning exercise & graduation. You will
also be provided with emergency equipment to
keep and use as needed.

- Tuesday, Oct 17 and Thursday, Oct 19
- Tuesday, Oct 24 and Thursday, Oct 26

Supplemental Training

Supplemental training is highly recommended. Your Instructors will explain this more in depth; with most of the courses taken online. Once completed, a FEMA certificate will be emailed to you. CERT will need a copy to add to your folder.

NIMS (National Incident Management System) Online Training:

- IS-100.a Introduction to Incident Command System (ICS)
- IS-200.a ICS for Single Resources
- IS-700.a National Incident Management System (NIMS), An Introduction
- IS-800.b National Response Framework, An Introduction
- Additional damage assessment

- Taking care of yourself, your family and your neighborhood
- Residential / Neighborhood check
- Medical intervention (triage or treatment)
- Sandbagging during flooding situations
- Staffing Emergency Operating Center
- Community relations / Distribution of emergency information to the public

Types of emergencies/disasters to which the CERTs have responded:

- Floods
- Tornados
- Severe Weathers
- Severe Winter Storms
- Earthquakes

Non-Emergency Functions

Non-emergency functions performed by CERT members:

- Conduct and support emergency preparedness efforts and projects, including sharing information with the public about protective actions and encouraging them to practice
- Support for public safety at community events
