Presidents Corner:

The great thing about Ham Radio is there are so many diverse and wonderful ways to enjoy and experiment with radio technology and techniques. Whether the bands are horrible or whether there is propagation to everywhere, there is always people on the air doing something.

Those who know me also know that my favorite thing to do with radio is communicate with Morse Code, or CW. It appears to me that the popularity of CW is on the rise again, and for lots of good reasons. To me the best things about CW are the way it is heard much better than voice in tough band conditions, and the satisfaction of having the skill to speak another language sort of.

On a terribly noisy band where there is poor propagation, CW gets through and can be heard long after voice communications becomes impossible. It is in my opinion the best mode to use when operating portable, or where conditions are not optimal. Voice communications relies on being able to hear voice tone and how each sound that makes up a word is intonated and formed by the speaker's mouth. With CW, if you can hear the presence or absence of a tone you can copy the message.

OK, "so what" you say? Well the biggest reason for me is I get so much enjoyment and pleasure communicating with CW. It relaxes me. And when I don't want to be relaxed, I can stretch my abilities in CW contesting, or ragchewing with others who send at a higher speed that forces me to improve my own speed capability. And I also enjoy using a variety of keys and keying devices, from straight keys and bugs to variations on the iambic paddles and keyers.

CW is on the rise, and it would be a cool thing to form a class and help one another learn CW among friends. If you would be interested please let me know. There are also lots of resources on the internet to help learn but starting out the right way is critical. If you are interested in being part of a CW group here in the tristate please talk with me about that.

But regardless of how you wish to learn, I encourage you to take another look at CW. Anyone can learn it. It takes a will to learn it. Do it!

Amateur Radio CubeSats

among 15 Set to Launch on October 21

AMSAT reports that an Antares II launch vehicle will carry 15 CubeSats into orbit on October 21 from Wallops Island as part of NASA Educational Launch of Nanosatellites (<u>FLaNa</u>) Mission 25. Some will carry Amateur Radio payloads.

- TJ REVERB, developed by students at Thomas Jefferson High School in Alexandria, Virginia, will carry a 145.825 MHz APRS digipeater.
- HuskySat, a University of Washington Seattle project, will be boosted into a 500-kilometer (approximately 310-mile) orbit via the Cygnus external deployment device. HuskySat will carry a V/U linear transponder provided in cooperation with AMSAT.

Other satellites announced for the ELaNa 25 launch include Argus (St. Louis University), 437 MHz telemetry; AzTechSat-1 (NASA Ames Research Center) 437 MHz telemetry; CySat (Iowa State University) 436 MHz telemetry; Phoenix (Arizona State University) 437 and 2400 MHz telemetry; RadSat-U (Montana State University) 437 MHz telemetry; SPOC (University of Georgia) 437 and 2400 MHz telemetry, and SwampSat II (University of Florida) 437 and 2400 MHz telemetry. -- Thanks to AMSAT News Service


